Trills in solo voice performance could begin on the upper note with a turn as termination. In choral performance, two repetitions without a termination may be preferred. (In the course of the late 18th C. execution of trills was becoming less formal, culminating in Hummel's assertion (1828) that they should begin on the main note.)
